J1 Visa Waiver Program

WHAT IS THE J-1 VISA WAIVER PROGRAM?

The J-1 VisaWaiver Program is a federal program that enables foreign national physicians to improve access to primary care and other health services in federally designated shortage areas, either in Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs) or Medically Underserved Areas/Medically Underserved Populations (MUAs/MUPs).

WHAT IS THE BACKGROUND OF THE J-1 VISA WAIVER PROGRAM?

In October 1994, a federal law was enacted that authorized state health departments to sponsor J-1Visa physicians to work in HPSAs or MUAs/MUPs. Currently, Maryland is allotted 30 slots for J-1VisaWaivers each year. Of these 30 slots, ten may be used for non-designated areas.

WHAT IS THE BASIS FOR A J-1 VISA WAIVER RECOMMENDATION?

In Maryland, the Primary Care Office (PCO) in the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) processes requests for J-1VisaWaivers. The recommendation of a waiver request by DHMH is dependent upon the physician and the medical practice meeting all federal and Maryland J-1VisaWaiver eligibility requirements.

DHMH will give preference to those applications from:

- Primary care foreign national physicians in designated HPSAs and MUAs/MUPs;
- Medical practices in underserved communities;
- Medical practices that have a demonstrated historic commitment to serving the underserved; and
- Those medical practices that have had difficulty recruiting physicians because of their geographic location.
